JUSTIFICATION:

The faculty of the Hugh Hodgson School of Music is proposing to change the name of the major in Music Performance (B.Mus.) to Music (B.Mus.). The faculty approved a vote to consolidate five separate majors under the Bachelor of Music degree (Music Composition, Music Education, Music Performance, Music Theory, and Music Therapy) into a single major, Music, with five areas of emphasis. Consolidation of these programs will allow students more flexibility in changing concentrations and specializations without increasing time to completion.

As many courses are shared between programs, this streamlined approach will allow the School to better utilize existing resources. The School of Music is accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the American Music Therapy Association, and currently offers the only residential Music Therapy program in Georgia. Eliminating redundancies in the current program structure will provide an opportunity for faculty to offer new areas of study to meet the changing professional landscape and demands of the music profession while maintaining a high quality of instruction.

The major in Music Composition (B.Mus.) provides three years of applied study on a major instrument (years one through three), as well as three years of intensive study in composition (years two through four). The program is designed to offer a strong foundation in theory and music literature along with applied study on a secondary instrument and prepares students for creative careers in the music industry as performers and composers of many styles of music.

It includes a comprehensive study in psychology and the social sciences and is structured to provide a foundation in the scientific application of music in rehabilitative environments. The program of study includes a large field experience component as well as an internship. Students completing the degree are eligible to become Board Certified Music Therapists after passing the Board Certification Examination.
