In my personal experience, over the last few years with Staff Council, I have gained institutional knowledge of the inner workings of UGA, professional contacts, personal contacts, and some good friends both on and off campus. Now I generally know who does what and whom to call if I need help or advice; something that was gained entirely through my Staff Council service. This has proven invaluable to both Staff Council and my job in the Department of Mathematics.

To see how volunteerism positively affects the employee, one need look no further than our own Dr. Jessica Rodell at the Terry College of Business, who published a paper entitled "Finding meaning through volunteering: Why do employees volunteer and what does it mean for their jobs?" published in the Academy of Management Journal in 2013.

Dr. Rodell stated, "Results suggested that volunteering was associated with both volunteer and job meaningfulness, and that the pull of meaningful volunteer work was even stronger when employees had less meaning in their jobs. The results further revealed benefits of volunteering for employers. Volunteering was related to job absorption but not job interference, and it was therefore associated with better job performance."

In short, participation in Staff Council makes staff members see their jobs as more meaningful; they are more productive, and bring the learned skills and contacts back to their jobs. There is no better reason to encourage staff members to be engaged in Staff Council or other volunteerism.
